# Maintain to Sustain: Delivering ASHRAE's Sustainability Promise

Any list of current challenges faced by our global community would include energy, food, and environment. ASHRAE is uniquely placed to address these three interrelated challenges. Buildings account for 40% of primary energy use in countries with developed economies. Food shortages and costs are dramatically impacted by rising energy costs and spoilage between harvest and market. Emissions from power generation are a major contributor to the 30 billion metric tons of CO2 we dump into our atmosphere every year. As ASHRAE advances the technology underlying efficient, healthy and productive buildings, we play a vital role in attacking all three interrelated challenges. We are pledged to provide guidance for net zero energy buildings to reduce the energy required for buildings in the future, but the vast majority of the buildings that will exist in 2030 exist today, and we must quickly attack energy use in existing buildings. Studies indicate that energy use in buildings can be reduced by 10% to 40% simply by improved operating strategies. ASHRAE must develop effective educational and certification programs to influence the use of energy in existing buildings, and deliver those programs to local audiences around the globe.

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#### Meet This Month's Speaker

William Harrison
2008-2009 President
American Society of Heating, Refrigerating
and Air-Conditioning Engineers

William Harrison is President of Trane Arkansas in Little Rock, Arkansas.

As ASHRAE's president, Harrison directs the Society's Board of Directors and oversees the Executive Committee. His presidential theme, *Maintain to Sustain – Delivering ASHRAE's Sustainability Promise*, focuses on operating buildings to deliver the energy efficiency inherent in their design, including effective commissioning, improved documentation, and programs to educate and certify building operators.

"If the studies are accurate, we have a no-regrets method to reduce energy use in buildings by 10 to 40 percent, solely by improving building operations," Harrison said. "All we have to do is communicate and educate more effectively. It is our duty. We are pledged to deliver ASHRAE's promise of sustainability, and to do that we must maintain to sustain, we must train to sustain, and we must influence the operation of our buildings to conserve energy."

He also is chair of the Headquarters Building Renovation Committee. He has served as president-elect, treasurer, vice president, Region VIII director and regional chair, chair of Member Council, Technology Council and the Finance Committee, a member of the Nominating Committee, and vice chair of the Refrigeration Committee and the Society Rules

Committee. Harrison was president of the Shreveport Chapter.

He has received the Distinguished Service Award. Harrison received a Bachelor of Science in industrial engineering from the University of Arkansas.

#### Stan Leitsch Receives Exceptional Service Award

ASHRAE's Exceptional Service Award recognizes Distinguished Award recipients who have continued to serve the Society faithfully and with exemplary effort. Stanley L. Leitsch, PE, Fellow/Life Member ASHRAE, of Audubon, Pennsylvania, recently received this award.



Stan Leitsch has been a member of ASHRAE

for 37 years. He was active in the Philadelphia Chapter and Region III for ten years and was Chapter President from 1977-1978. Stan was involved in seminars, annual meetings, and served four years on the Nominating Committee. He was General Chair for the Region III conference in 1980. At the Society level, Stan served on several standing committees over 33 years and was Chairman of two of these committees. He was Co-chair for the ASHRAE Philadelphia winter meeting in 1978 and was General Chairman for the ASHRAE winter meeting in Atlantic City in 1983. He served as the first ASHRAE/ CIBSE joint organizing Committee Member from 1986-1989. He also served on the Publishing and Long Range Planning Council. Stan was awarded Fellow Member grade in 1996 and Life Member in 1999. During his tenure, he served on several TC Committees over 27 years and was Seminar Chair at three Society meetings.

In 1963, Stan was the Senior Mechanical Engineer and Designer for a 20,000 square foot class 100 clean room. Several components were designed explicitly for this project as they were not available on the open market in the early years of clean room designs. Upon completion, it was the largest clean room constructed to date. From 1973-1980, Stan was the project engineer for a major TV tube manufacturing plant in Warsaw, Poland. All calculations and design documents were completed in the metric system, which was a first for his engineering firm. Similar plant design was also done for RCA/Thorn plant in Skelmersdale, England. Stan has made major contributions to the engineering profession and has been a dedicated member of ASHRAE Society.

#### **ASHRAE Research Fundraising Campaign**

In the US, an enormous amount of attention is paid to benchmarks and mandates for energy efficient vehicle design. It may surprise you to learn that transportation only accounts 28% of total energy consumption in the United States. Buildings account for 40% of our total energy consumption. The building industry now looks to ASHRAE for more efficient solutions, and ASHRAE Research is delivering.

The overriding principal of the ASHRAE Research Strategic Plan is sustainability. The world has finite resources and sustaining these resources to the best of our ability is becoming increasingly important. ASHRAE Technical Committees develop specific research topics in support of the plan's goals. #### In Memoriam

#### Joseph M. Smaul, PE, NSPE

Joseph M. Smaul, PE, NSPE, left us suddenly on Monday, July 14, 2008. A devoted husband, loving father and grandfather to his immediate family, Joe shared himself with us all as a friend, colleague, mentor and educator throughout his long distinguished career in the design and construction industry.



It was both my privilege and good fortune to have known Joe for many years. To say the least, he was very special and dear to me, as he was to many others.

Joe was unique in many ways, not only for his range of knowledge and experience in the design and construction industry, but also for his interest in (and devotion to) the development of an education curriculum for plumbing engineering as a distinct and necessary element of building design and construction. He was an active member of ASPE, ASHRAE, and NSPE and a devoted teacher in the ASSE/ASPE Plumbing Design School.

Possessed with a good heart and a strong devotion to the welfare of his family and career, Joe developed a balance between both (something we all struggle to do with varying degrees of success). A sharply dressed man, Joe spoke with a clarity that was second to none in the industry. He had a natural wisdom in all aspects of the profession, which often pleasantly surprised many who came in contact with him. His persistence in standing up to the construction managers was unprecedented, as evidenced in his newsletter articles on the subject. Joe insisted that "you as the engineer have the power" to say no to submittals that you did not specify and there is no such thing as "or equal".

I called Joe often to seek advice or a second opinion. Whether we discussed technical or personal issues, the depth of his answers always amazed me. 
#### In Memoriam

#### **MEMBERSHIP ADVANCEMENT!**

Any Associate Member meeting the following requirement can apply for Advancement to the more entitling Member grade. By ASHRAE society definition:

A *member* shall have the equivalent of *twelve society-approved years of experience* composed of an approved combination of: (a) completed education beyond high school, (b) work experience, and (c) professional engineering or related registration or license issued by a legally authorized body.

All technical and scientific education shall be based on curricula approved by the Board of Directors.

Approved engineering curricula shall be equivalent to the accredited by the Accreditation Board of Engineering and Technology in the United States of America or the Canadian Engineering Accreditation Board. Scientific education in fields other than engineering shall be from a college or university course of study that has been accredited by an organization charged with monitoring standards of performance. Society approved years of experience shall be credited as follows:

One and one-half years of credit for each year of completed education for graduates of approved technical curricula. One year of credit for each year of education for non-graduates who have completed a least two years of approved technical curricula. One year of credit for each year of completed education for graduates of colleges or universities which do not have accreditations. Those holding associated degrees from technical institutions shall also be credited for one year for each year of education.

One year for each year of qualifying work experiences in the performance of duties in work related to ASHRAE fields of interest and shall have included research, teaching, design, contracting, engineering sales or engineering management.

Three years of credit for professional registration of license issued by a legally authorized body in engineering or related fields, the requirements of which as to education, examination, and active practice are satisfactory to the Board of Directors.
