This issue contains a summary of ASHRAE activities that most people normally do not hear about, but might be of interest. Items such as Solar Decathlon, Student Design Competition, research spending, new member educational programs, electronic Journal and code activities. Hope you find it beneficial.

<u>Career Resources</u>: A new internship program will be available in the fall 2006 for student members. This will offer a guide for students seeking internships, a guide for employers who are seeking interns, and an online program where students can learn about available internships in ASHRAE-related businesses.

<u>Undergraduate Senior Project Grant Program</u>: Twenty six projects in the 05-06 Undergraduate Senior Project Grant program are underway totaling \$110,000. Twenty six projects totaling \$120,000 have been selected for the 06-07 program

<u>Post-High</u>: We have 225 active student branches. We are happy to announce we have our first two student branches in Pakistan. ASHRAE Society will be serving as a title sponsor to the 2007 Solar Decathlon in Washington, D.C. Planning is underway with the support of the Solar Decathlon Ad-Hoc Committee.

Student Design Competition: The 2006 competition of Dallas Power & Light recently concluded. Winners will be announced no later than Friday, August 4, 2006. The 2007 competition is nearing completion and will feature a recently redesigned building in New York City, USA.

<u>K-12</u>: ASHRAE promoted and supported E-Week 2006 and Introduce-a-Girl-to-Engineering Day (IAG). We offered buttons and certificates for participants in IAG programs our chapter members facilitated. The Atlanta Chapter cosponsored Georgia Tech's annual Introduce a Girl to Engineering Day, which was held on Saturday, February 18, 2006. The program included more than 200 participating middle and high school girls, as well as the support of several businesses and engineering societies.

<u>Promotion</u>: The new version of the Careers in HVACR movie is currently being produced and is themed "It Ain't Cool to be Hot!"

CTTC Satellite Broadcasts/Webcasts: The second CTTC Satellite Broadcast, "Sustainability and the Building Environment," was completed on April 19, 2006 with just over 8,900 viewers. Two Professional Development Hour (PDH) credits were awarded to participants and reported to the appropriate state licensing agencies.

Homeland Security Satellite Broadcast: November 14, 2006 satellite broadcast/webcast, "Multiple Benefits Solutions for Enhanced Building Security". ". This free ASHRAE program will provide information for building owners, occupants, and those who design and implement measures to reduce vulnerability to terrorist attacks as well as natural and accidental incidents in buildings.

<u>Distinguished Lecturer Program</u>: A total of 110 visits were made by the forty-one Distinguished Lecturers participating in 2005-2006.

Research: Year to date, 21 new research projects were approved for funding. Eleven projects were completed, leaving 81 projects under contract with a total value of \$8.2 million, of which \$2.8 million remains to be paid after accruals.

<u>Technical Services</u>: <u>Technical Services</u> has responded to an average of 15 technical inquiries per day related to ASHRAE publications and other general HVAC&R topics. The frequently asked question (FAQ) section on the Web site now addresses 92 questions.

Education: ASHRAE launched its first eLearning System in partnership with Elsevier, Ltd. The program offers online, on-demand interactive learning. The first course "HVAC Systems" was released in April. The second course "Fundamentals of 90.1" is scheduled for release in September.

<u>Journal</u>: In May, ASHRAE launched the digital edition of ASHRAE Journal. The digital Journal allows members to view and print complete issues of ASHRAE Journal as they are published.

Code Interaction Committee: CIS submitted ten code change proposals for the upcoming ICC hearings in September 2006. Three alternative proposals were written for Standard 62.1, two proposals were submitted for Standard 90.2 and five proposals were submitted for Standard 90.1.

In addition, to sustaining and growing your chapter membership and providing your new members with a valuable service, there are 50 PAOE points available for chapters with active Mentoring Programs.

Remember, ASHRAE is a volunteer organization, as are many other trade organizations, and we rely on the active participation of our membership to provide the technical expertise, develop the standards and provide the programs currently offered. A willing volunteer who is not utilized is a tremendous waste of a valuable resource. A good Mentoring Program can eliminate this waste. Student Activities

"Since we don't have any ASHRAE Student Branches in our chapter, we really don't have anything we can do to earn Student Activities points."

Too often today, we are focusing most of our efforts on the post high school arena – colleges, universities, and technical schools with HVAC&R programs. We find it easier to work with the students who already have the interest in HVAC&R, whether it's maintaining relationships with existing branches, or forming new branches. Unfortunately, fewer students are choosing careers in engineering, which further squeezes the numbers that enter the HVAC&R field.

At the Student Activities Committee meetings held this past June at the Annual Meeting in Quebec, most of our efforts were spent addressing how we change this trend. Professional and Technical Societies throughout the United States, including ASHRAE have made promoting engineering careers to young people a priority. Studies have indicated that children are losing interest in math and science at about the sixth grade level. Speculation is that there may be a lack of qualified teachers for math and science above this level, as typically, people who are strong in these areas do not go into teaching careers. As a result, many of those who are teaching may be intimidated by the subjects and be less enthusiastic when teaching.

The Student Activities Committee consists of a Chair and Vice Chair, the SAC-RVC's, ABET Accreditation Representatives, and a representative of the Society Board of Directors and a Coordinating Officer. The SAC has been tasked with developing a virtual "cool science" kit that can be accessed on the internet. It will include target grade levels, a materials list, and will walk you through each experiment, including the lessons that are being taught. It is intended to make it easier to do your K-12 visits. We have specifically targeted the sixth grade, however, it is very important that the Chapter SAC Chair and committee members make these visits to supplement the teachers efforts.

For this upcoming year, you will find three PAOE items related to K-12:

- 25 points for each K-12 activity (other than National Engineers Week) that the Chapter members participate in.
- 25 points for each K-12 activity to and for girls.
- 25 points for each National Engineers Week Activity

One other item that may be new to you is the Young Engineers in ASHRAE (YEA). It is important to get the young people in ASHRAE involved and heard. A YEA member is an ASHRAE members 30 years old and under. Members can become YEA members through the ASHRAE website. Two PAOE categories are specific to YEA members:

- 50 points for each YEA member assigned to a committee to provide YEA ideas and participation.
- 25 points for each YEA member that presents a YEA program to a student branch.

This years CRC will be held in Pittsburgh, August 10 -12, 2006. The student activities workshop will be held on Saturday, August 12. I plan to make it much different than any workshop that you have attended in the past. Please come with your ideas and experiences to share with the Region!

Chapters Regional Conference (CRC)

The primary intent of this message is to invite the CTTC Chairs and the sub-Committee Chairs responsible for Chapter Programs, TEGA, and Refrigeration to the upcoming Region III Chapters Regional Conference (CRC). For those of you who may not know what CRC is all about, the CRC is an annual conference designed to fulfill two primary purposes.

First, it is a one-day (Friday) business meeting. ASHRAE is a grassroots organization, and CRC is an opportunity for delegates from the Chapters in the Region to come together and report on the state of their chapters, learn about other chapters, nominate regional and society officers for the coming year, and make suggestions about how the Society could be improved.

Second, it is a one-day (Saturday) training session for chapter officers and committee chairs. There are several sessions designed to cover issues related to the structure and state of ASHRAE Society as a whole; on a parallel track there are a series of breakout sessions for the grassroots committees and various other important chapter functions. In a nutshell, it is a one-day introduction to managing an ASHRAE Chapter.

CT² encompasses such a vast array of material, it has evolved into a half-day workshop on Saturday afternoon. Attendance at this session is vital to the success of the Chapter Programs, TEGA, and Refrigeration activities of your Chapter. Attendance is also part of your job description as a Chapter Committee Chair. It is mandatory, and there are PAOE points riding on your attendance at the session (Hopefully, you know about PAOE. If not, we'll talk about it in the near future.).

Goal Setting Discussion

Since we are all in the process (hopefully) of finalizing our plans for the year in advance of CRC, let me warn you that I'll be calling each of you to have a discussion about your planning and to establish two or three primary goals you hope to achieve this year. Yes, this is part of the PAOE; and we need to have this conversation in order for you to get your points. I was a poor performer on this aspect of our program last year, and I'm resolved to do it right this year.

Distinguished Lecturer Series

Hopefully, everyone is familiar with the Distinguished Lecturer Program. I'll be talking more about this Program throughout the year, but let me give you a few highlights now. ASHRAE has pulled together a number of speakers who have been recommended as engaging and expert. Their topics relate to issues that are current and relevant. The Program was initially envisioned to be a way to bring more high-powered speakers to struggling Chapters, but it has blossomed into a program that is benefiting the majority of the Chapters in Society each year.

We have seven allocations for the coming year. An allocation means that if you follow the procedures of the Program, Society will pay the travel costs related to getting the DL to your Chapter (and home again). One of these allocations is targeted for use at the Technical Sessions of the CRC. So if your Chapter is hosting a CRC in the future, plan on using a DL for one of the Tech Sessions. We will revisit and adjust the allocations based on our conversations at CRC.

This is a great program, and it's easy to take advantage of it. And you don't have to have an allocation to use a DL. But, if you don't have an allocation, your Chapter will have to cover any travel costs related to bringing the DL to your meeting. So every Chapter should plan to bring in a DL this year.
